Death Claims N. Ankerson

Elmwood Has Biggest Gain

ELMWOOD — Elmwood township, adjoining to Traverse City on the north, leads all Northern county townships in population gain over the past 24 years, according to Census Bureau reported this week.

Mr. Elmer C. Miller, county clerk, Elmwood, gained 161 and the township's net gain was 560, from 647 to 1,216.

Seven townships show gains, while four show losses. Diminution increased by 361, Stoen, 32; Glen Arbor, 35; Bigay, 36; Colborn, 28; and Keweenaw, 28.

Townships having populations were Rosedale, 340; Sutton Bay, 11; Glenerville, 31; and Cleveland, 17.


