REMARKS: The general character of the soil is black loamy. The timber is principally Maple & Beech interspersed with Basswood, Ash, Elm and occasionally Cedar and Hemlock. The rocks are Lime and the natural fertilities are lime, manure and shells. The water hard and very pure. There is an entire absence of swamps, marshes, stagnant water and Chyrocians; consequently general health always prevails.
