The prospect is now favorable that we will again cross to the mainland upon the ice.

From February 30<sup>th</sup> to Jan 21<sup>st</sup> [sic] we were without mail, owing to the inclemency of the weather.

Nearly all who own timbered lands here are busy. A lively winter makes a lively summer.

On the morning of January 22d the mercury stood at zero, that being the coldest of the season.

One cold, windy evening a few nights ago, the merry jingle of sleigh-bells was heard upon the highway. It proved to be a party of youngsters out for an enjoyable time. I guess they had it too.
